Evangelical- What's In a Name?

This October 8th, we are excited to once again welcome in some new members. This is our evangelism at work! Then again, let's step back and think about what we mean by some of the words we use.

Indeed, we Lutheran Christians have often been justifiably accused of using words that are little understood or misunderstood completely. For instance, many have wondered why our tradition would say in the Apostles' Creed- We believe in the holy "catholic church" – aren't we supposed to be Lutheran? Well, it turns out that we are using a common word- catholic - in an unusual way. Usually this word refers to the domination known as the "Roman Catholic Church". Yet in the creed, it means something like "universal", as in, We believe in the universal church, (the church of every time and place.)

Another of our more confusing words is in the name of our particular brand of Lutheranism- *The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America*. As we know, in our culture the word *evangelical* usually refers to a political affiliation. Now ELCA Lutherans may have any number of political affiliations in their private lives, yet when it comes to our denomination's name, politics is not what we are talking about at all.



Evangelical- What's In a Name?

In fact the word *evangelical* harkens back to an old Greek word that appears throughout the New Testament-evangelion (εὐαγγέλιον). Fundamentally, this word translates to *good news* or *gospel*. Sometimes it's used as a verb to mean *preaching*. Other times it appears as a noun, as in *a message* or *gospel book*. Either way, *evangelion* describes the central mission Jesus gave to his followers- *to bring the good news of God's grace to the world*.

So you could say our denomination's name translates to- *Bringers of Good News Lutheran Church in America*- though admittedly, this doesn't exactly roll off the tongue.

Now some have argued that in today's polarized world, this isn't how most people hear the word *evangelical*, and therefore we should abandon it. Others say this very fact is all the more reason to stick with it, so that we might restore *evangelical* to its proper meaning.

Personally, I see both sides of the argument. Yet in a larger sense, what we call ourselves is less important than what we actually are. And what we are- or at least what Jesus calls us to be- is people who reach out to others with the good news of God's love. Because Jesus spirituality is communal.

Now to be fair, even the idea of reaching out in faith is somewhat debated these days. Many believe that faith should be a totally private matter. Why should we force our faith down the throats of others, after all? Well of course, we shouldn't be coercive in our spiritual outreach- Jesus certainly never was.

Yet Jesus also consistently urged his followers not to hide (under a bushel basket) the love we have discovered in God, because in fact many in this world are desperately hungry for it. And as we are seeing, it turns out the things that make this world a better place - generosity, forgiveness, humility, compassion – are not givens. They are learned behaviors. Loving people are the result of people who have been immersed in love. And the opposite is also true. Spiritually speaking, we are what we eat.

So let us say proudly- We are evangelicals! Maybe not always in the normal usage of the term, but in the sense that we believe that good spirituality is something that's worth sharing and living out together.

And so whatever we call ourselves, we give thanks for the God who calls us to be gracious and open with others about the faith that give us life!

Stained Glass Window Update

Tom & Liz Ball made a visit to the studio of Phil and Jane Watkins which is located in Englewood, Colorado. The studio is approximately the size of four garages with eight workstations. Seven of those workstations are for on-going restoration projects. The final workstation is for COJ. Phil has placed the pattern for our stained-glass window over a




light. He has started to choose the colors of each piece, marking the color name and number. Phil believes he will have Step 1 of this project completed by the end of September.

Step 2: To develop the

actual pattern which requires heavier paper and the final transfer of the color and the number to said pattern. The pattern is then cut into individual pieces. Phil thinks this stained-glass window will be approximately 350 to 400 pieces.

When cutting the pattern, Phil uses a unique scissors. When he actually cuts the pattern, a thin white space appears. That white space will eventually be filled with zinc. This small space plus the glass will eventually measure out to




The other seven workstations have on-going restoration projects. Each is unique and requires special skills. The simplest is to replace the broken glass with a matching piece of glass of the same color and year that glass was produced. The more complicated restoration is actually painting the exact image from the original drawing of the image to the exact specifications of the new glass panel.

Three general observations:

#1: The entire ceiling is open. It is filled with hundreds of scrolls. Each one of those scrolls represents one

project. Unbelievable!



#3: Soldering technique: A+++++

We were excited to see the progress that has been made on our window. We also learned how much other work the two of them are currently doing. We were also blessed that the Lord has led COJ to these two craftsmen and skilled artists!

We asked for a date estimate and got the response that they are working on it in conjunction with current restoration projects. We hope this update finds you waiting as anxiously and patiently as we are for its completion.
